Ontario Nurses' Association Calls on Victorian Order of Nurses to Pay Fair for Home Care Ahead of Bargaining

TORONTO, ON, September 8, 2025 – Armed with new statistics showing staggering rates of workplace violence against registered nurses (RNs) employed by the Victorian Order of Nurses (VON), the Ontario Nurses' Association (ONA) held a media conference today with the Official Opposition to call for fair pay and better funding for home care.

"Home care RNs are the lowest-paid nurses in the province, despite facing among the worst working conditions," said ONA Provincial President Erin Ariss, RN. "The system is hanging by a thread now. Understaffed, unsafe and underpaid RNs are leaving the sector, as the largely female workers face a staggering amount of violence – five times that of nurses in other health-care sectors."

Contract talks between the VON and ONA begin this week; VON nurses are currently paid 14 per cent less in real wages than 10 years ago and are not compensated for the full cost of mileage nor – in many cases – the hours it takes to travel from one client to another. ONA bargaining team chair for VON, Lorna Thompson, RN, says "this is a pivotal contract for those of us who are passionate about providing high-quality, holistic health care to our clients. We are putting VON on notice that it must respect and pay us properly. Our wages are currently so low that many of us are forced to take on second jobs or visit food banks, and the low wages are a barrier to hiring and retaining nurses. We demand equal pay for our work and expect nothing less."

Evidence shows that home care – especially not-for-profit home care – is essential. It saves the health-care system much-needed funds and helps keep people from needing hospital care or long-term care. VON nurses support clients with complex medical needs, provide palliative care and care for those with chronic health conditions," says Ariss.

"With Ontario's aging population expected to grow dramatically in the coming years, we cannot afford to ignore the working conditions driving home care nurses away. We call on the Ford government and VON to pay fair for home care."

ONA is the union representing over 68,000 registered nurses and health-care professionals, as well as 18,000 nursing student affiliates, providing care in hospitals, long-term care, public health, the community, clinics, and industry.

Public Health Nurses at Algoma Public Health Head to Conciliation, Seeking to Reach a New Negotiated Contract with Fair Pay and Job Security

ALGOMA, ON, September 12, 2025 – Public health nurses in Algoma (Sault Ste. Marie, Wawa, Blind River and Elliot Lake) are heading to conciliation on Monday as they seek to negotiate a new contract.

"Our skilled nurses are sounding the alarm about the growing crisis in public health," says Ontario Nurses' Association (ONA) Provincial President Erin Ariss, RN. "Chronic understaffing, increased workloads and stagnant wages are pushing the system — and those who rely on it — to the breaking point.

"Nurses working in northern communities are on the front lines of essential public health services, from maternal and child health, chronic disease prevention, vaccinations, infectious disease case management, and emergency response. Despite their critical role, these nurses are paid some of the lowest wages in the province," she says. Ariss notes that "these nurses carried their communities through a global pandemic and a large measles outbreak, yet their work continues to be undervalued. Falling behind other health units makes it impossible to recruit and retain staff – and the public will pay the price."

There have been three days of negotiations to date, and among the key issues facing the 60 registered nurses and one nurse practitioner are understaffing; the lowest public health nurse wages in the province; burnout due to heavy workloads; and a lack of job security.

During conciliation, the nurses will seek competitive compensation that reflects the unique challenges of northern practice and cost of living; investment in recruitment to reach safer staffing levels that ensure safe, sustainable, and equitable access to health care for all communities; and job protection.

"Public health nurses are the backbone of rural and northern health care," says Ariss.

"Algoma Public Health nurses are stretched so thin that their ability to provide safe, high-quality care is at risk. Communities deserve better, and so do the nurses who serve them."
